Dear Mr. Peonides,

I have the pleasure to inform you that you have been identified as a candidate for inclusion in the forthcoming InterData publication, *Who's Who at the United Nations*. The nomination is based on our initial research, describing you as a person affiliated to the United Nations in a principal category specified by our editors, meeting at least one of our criteria for inclusion.

As you may know, there have been very few comprehensive works of this kind during the history of the United Nations, the most recent being the "Who's Who in the United Nations and Related Agencies," published by a New York Times company in 1975. The 1992 volume, the first by InterData, is intended as a definitive current record of the life, career and accomplishment of the international decision-makers and distinguished professionals who shape the worldwide community of the United Nations and its specialized agencies. Today, there is no similar source book.

The criteria for inclusion provide for the selection of those individuals, who, based on their accomplishment and/or position in a particular field of United Nations endeavor, have achieved significant reference value. It should be noted that there is never a cost to a biographee for inclusion in the InterData volume. Nor there is any obligation to purchase the book.

As may be expected, the book is being compiled by editors actively involved in the work of the United Nations and the specialized agencies, as diplomats, staff members or international organization specialists. In fact, our chief editor* has been an international civil servant with the United Nations for years. This of course does not imply any UN (or other) sponsorship of the project, which is an entirely independent endeavor.

As far as your biography is concerned, we have found that certain information about you have been in the public domain for some time. Although valuable in many ways, however, such information is usually either incomplete or inaccurate. I have therefore included for your attention a computerized biographical infoform, which I would like to invite you to complete and return to our editors as soon as possible.

Finally, as our selection process operates within a rather tight schedule, your urgent attention to this matter should be greatly appreciated.

I look forward to receiving and processing your information soon.
