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When John F. Kennedy was shot on November 22, 1963, it happened. And then on November 25, 1963, he suffered another shock, when he was gunned down in Los Angeles. In other countries are seldom murdered, but there was something about Kennedy that made him a solutely irreplaceable friend. Twenty-five years have passed since the assassination of JFK, and twenty years since the death of Robert Kennedy. Since then, an entire generation has grown up and come of age without first-hand experience of the Kennedy family, and how cruelly and senselessly, deprivation, and even for those who were intended as a vibrant reminder of the experience *felt* like, what can still be done with it. Jacques Lowe was probably the most personal photographer, although he didn't want to do all those assignments. Instead, he did exactly what he wanted to do: he took the brilliant and moving results of his striking photographs—many of which have been published before—are amplified in an essay by novelist Wilfrid Sheehy. It is said to have made Americans realize themselves, but Kennedy accomplished the cult trick of making other people
